70 Years of NSC History in a Nutshell

It is with gratitude that I reflect over my close to 50 years with NSC. It has had its share of downsides, from x-country skiing over a rail trestle, not knowing if a train was coming; finishing a race going headfirst into a ski rack; being dragged up the Red Poma on my butt; winning the most improved skier award - twice!; multiple "adventures" on our Puff and Putts; skiing through severe health issues; getting "taxi" rides down in the Ski Patrol sled; and most recently, getting no sympathy for an injured finger. If all that is the downside of a lifetime of skiing, I consider myself fortunate.

Experiencing the joy of skiing and the companionship at the Lodge as a member of NSC, on weekends as well as midweek, has been a great run, and I hope it keeps on going. When you read through the club's history, and all the "discussions", you see we're all in it for the same thing, and it is worth it. For the sake of skiing – in spite of cold, rain, ice, and falls, and working together to make it happen - what would we rather do?

And now, the club's story...

A few names are mentioned below, but our club's history depends on the work of **many hundreds** of our members.

1955 –A group of engineers from the Naval Underwater Ordinance Station in Newport, who happen to be skiing enthusiasts, get together after work, and a ski club is born.

Dick Marciano is the first president, elected at the very first meeting. Movies after each meeting are a must. And lots of parties and outings!

The first club activity is water skiing at King Park in Newport. Being composed of engineers, the club will "investigate" various ski areas and lodges over several years.

1956 – Newport Yacht Club offers free space for our meetings, since the bar tab will surely compensate them for the hall rental.

Okemo Mountain opens, with two surface Poma lifts and three trails, one of which is the existing road up the mountain. One of the lifts is the Red Poma, the longest Pomalift in the country. Each ride on the Red Poma costs 60 cents. Yes, that was a lot!

- 1961 The NSC telephone tree is established. The membership list is broken up in teams, and each "captain" only has to call a few people to get the word out to all. We've gone high tech!
- 1964 Newport Ski Club is officially incorporated.
- 1965 NSC purchases a vacant lot near the base of Okemo for \$1,200. Member Chris Dutra designs a ski house (a.k.a. the Lodge), and ten members co-sign a construction Mortgage.

Okemo takes a giant leap forward and installs its first chairlift, the Sachem Double.

1966 – A disagreement with the contractor is settled over 2 cases of beer, before the lawyers show up. The result is our two downstairs bathrooms, apparently thrown in at no cost.

The Lodge is completed. Cost: \$24,910 for the building plus \$6.50 a foot for the well digger. The new well produces only 1½ gallons/minute. John Brady's comments:

"Do we want to dig a well or build a lodge?", and "If it's yellow, let it mellow!"

Frank Item and his team build our much-discussed-since picnic tables: --Should we have booths? --Tables and folding chairs?

1967 – The club drafts rules for the Lodge, "An Invitation to Ski".

1968 – After much debate over chimney colors, each member can "buy" a chimney brick for \$1 to paint however they choose. Chaos ensues... until it is painted white years later.

Hank Chubbock donates a beautiful coffee table he made, with a wrought-iron base and wooden slats.

Sheila Item is providing reports of NSC Good and Welfare.

1970 – Snow falls off the Lodge roof and damages 5 cars. This is not the last time that will happen.

1971 – The club orders new mattresses. Ed Bradbury builds new bunks in his basement and brings them to the Lodge in Bud Scott's truck. Every room is to have a fire-escape ladder.

- 1972 Treasurer's report includes records of our deposit-bottles-and-cans account. We skiers are a thrifty bunch, and recyclers!
- 1975 New living-room couches: Ed Bradbury builds the steel frames at work, and members put the rest together at the Lodge. After the usual endless discussion about colors for the cushions, the club decides on HoJo's orange and blue.
- 1976 Club discusses hiring a cook for Saturday nights.
- 1978 Mortgage is paid off and burned...a ceremonial copy. The original is on the wall at the Lodge.
- 1979 Club has an all-female Executive Board Peg Vincent president. Club bonds are floated to members to pay for the needed roof replacement. This explains why Peg is always suggesting bonds as the way to pay for our capital expenses.
- 1980 Our lift ticket purchase procedure is complicated. Apparently we get tickets at "bus" rates in groups 20 on weekends, but the club also buys bulk tickets for when we do not have a group of 20. A Mountain Liaison is designated to interface with Okemo and other ski areas to deal with the procedure.
- 1982 After a few years debating the issue, the club votes to buy a dishwasher and get rid of plastic plates. In the end, even John Brady votes in favor of the \$3,000 cost.

Reminder at the April meeting: Bring pencils to vote for club officers next month. Yes, real elections.

The Muellers, new owners of Okemo, start investing in dramatic improvements to the mountain. Their first investment is a triple chair... no more Red Poma!

1983 – Club beer at the Lodge is discontinued. It is now BYO.

Replacing the Lodge floor is brought up at a meeting and discussed ad nauseum.

1984 – The Lodge is tied into the Ludlow sewer system.

After years of walking back to the Lodge for hot soup at lunchtime, and of having to take time out of skiing for lunch duty, discussions begin over an alternate plan.

1986 – Dennis Macedo chairs a committee to study lunches. Now lunch duty will be required only if you eat at the Lodge.

1988 –A "final" decision is made on lunch. Lunch materials will be laid out for members to make sandwiches to bring to the mountain. Elliott Perchuck claims credit for this idea.

Membership is full at 180 active members, with 42 applicants on file. Limit is raised to 200, but that limit is never reached.

The Newport Yacht Club will no longer serve us drinks as nonmembers. After a heated debate, we vote to move our meetings to the Green Valley Country Club, even though we have met at the Yacht Club since our inception, and Green Valley is outside of Newport. We are the NEWPORT Ski Club after all!

The Green Valley clubhouse burns down the very next week, so we have to stay at the Yacht Club another year. In spite of some members' flagrant objections to the move, no one from our club was responsible for the fire (NOT GUILTY!). We will move to Green Valley a year later and stay for a number of years.

- 1990 Fire escapes are added at the Lodge a coincidence?
- 1991 23 members go on Lynn LeBlanc's ski trip to Aspen, one of several Club ski trips she will lead. Highlight: Sue Wilson, paralyzed from a fall at work, takes up adaptive skiing, which allows her to continue to enjoy our favorite sport.
- 1993 After a failed experiment with a smoke eater, complaints that the fireplace is smoky anyway, and a few years of inability to decide whether we want a "smoking area" or a "no-smoking area", the membership votes to ban smoking at the Lodge, on an "experimental" basis. Some members quit in protest.
- 1994 The quality of wine at our Saturday dinners is questioned. After long discussions of ending Club wine or not, we agree to buy cheap wine by the bottle instead of the jug.

Okemo opens the South Face area.

1995 – Our member-built picture windows are professionally replaced, over John Brady's objections, after years of shaking in the wind and being covered in plastic wrap to keep out the cold.

1997 – After years of members' painting one side each year, Sid's team repaints the whole Lodge in a single work weekend, with the help of Bud King's paint sprayer. Members object to the Barn Red stain color. Vinnie Martinelli climbs up on the roof and hangs over the edge to paint the beams underneath.

1998 – Pressurized water storage tanks are installed in the basement, to give enough water for showers and to allow flushing toilets at every use. No more mellow yellow.

After some concerns about break-ins because everyone knew where the key was hidden, a key card entry system is installed.

1999 – Club joins CT Ski Council (CSC) to get discounted bulk ski tickets for members and to enjoy CSC appreciation days.

2001 – After much discussion, our soda machine is removed.

New Anderson windows are installed throughout the Lodge,

2002 – Our new neighbor challenges our access via their driveway, and we will have to redesign our parking lot. We learn about adverse possession vs. permission, the hard way.

2003 –Dan Reardon designs a breakfast coffee bar, and the milk machine is eliminated. Steve DePaola and his committee install pine paneling in the living/dining area in one work weekend.

CATL committee discusses policies for when children may be left alone at the Lodge. 18 becomes the magic age.

Major bylaw revision by Sid and his committee... Mostly a cleanup of wording, but there are now term limits for officers. Retaining Members do not receive membership cards and therefore cannot participate in "CSC Days" (discounts at other mountains). The idea is to discourage members' going retaining to avoid their obligations, though RMs can still buy bulk tickets.

Okemo extends to the northeast and opens Jackson Gore.

2005 – New Lodge parking lot is completed. Clotheslines around the perimeter keep cars from driving over the edge.

2007 – Kitchen is renovated by Steve DePaola's committee and comes in under budget. New cabinets, floor, and sinks.

A new stainless-steel island top is installed as well, since the old wooden island was forever getting inundated by bathroom leaks above. EWW! The bathroom leaks will get fixed shortly afterwards via high-tech pressurized flushers, so no more ceiling drips.

2008 – After a lengthy discussion (unanswered phone calls vs. personal contact), the club votes to accept email reservations.

2009 – Big debate over Retaining Members' rights:

Okemo now requires a club ID to redeem CSC tickets. An RM complains that with no card he and 10 his non-member buddies can't use the CSC tickets we sold him. We "cheated" him!

Paul Doughty maintains that members go retaining just to avoid responsibilities, and proposes a bylaw amendment to further limit their rights. RMs should be Social Members: No cards or club tickets, and no lodge reservations. The amendment is tabled while a committee led by Elaine Colarusso studies the situation. John Brady says "Leave them alone, they have been good long-term members. And give them back their cards."

In the end, after much heated discussion, the status quo prevails. Retaining Members do not get cards, but can make reservations.

2012 – Mattresses at the Lodge are replaced, after only 40 years.

2014 – The club votes to stop serving Club wine with Saturday dinner, so the squabble over wine quality is behind us.

2015 – As the club ages, more members ski midweek. Weekend skiers complain that the midweek skiers rearrange the furniture every week, and have even cut one of the couches in half for flexibility. A committee to set midweek policies is disbanded without ever meeting.

There are discussions over whether putting 5% of the budget into reserves is enough to prepare for unforeseen expenses.

Okemo opens a high speed 6-pack bubble chair.

2016 – New couch cushions replace the orange and blue naugahyde ones. No more "HoJo's" look.

George Daglieri takes over maintenance. The well gets fracked, and now we will have plenty of water at the Lodge. On the other hand, the bartender at Fenner Hall is no longer available, so there is no alcohol at meetings.

2017 – Lodge exterior is professionally repainted, after 15 years, and the woodshed is replaced, with a concrete pad.

Okemo now uses an RFID pass you carry in your pocket.

2018 – Lots of discussions of how to buy CSC tickets. How many should the Club buy? Are we losing money? etc. But this will soon change, as Vail has bought Okemo.

NSC Family Memberships are no more, we are all Individual Members. Will this discourage families from joining?

2019 – Cubbies are installed in the Lodge near the manager's desk to store personal food, etc.

2020 – The big news in 2020, and at least through 2021, is COVID. Zoom meetings and an ad hoc COVID Committee. The ski season is curtailed. The Lodge and the mountain close down early, as we deal with the state COVID regulations.

Steve and Anna have to sleep in a tent while they replace the back porch. Skiers are a hardy bunch.

2021– Attendance at the Lodge is restricted to 4 groups in "pods" for COVID safety... the thought arises of a need for more family rooms. Vaccination requirements, etc. become a major bone of contention. Some members quit in protest.

2022 – In-person meetings return, with a hybrid Zoom option. A garbage disposal is installed. Yes, we do have a sewer.

Steve Corbett and his team are at work... with lots of members' help: Major room renovation projects in upstairs bedrooms: dropped ceilings, new floors and walls, and sound-proofing. You no longer hear your neighbor's snoring through the wall. George is in charge of the ceiling gang ... did we say LOTS of help?

Vail's Epic Pass program is in full swing. No more CSC tickets, and the club will soon drop CSC membership. The new passes cost less than half what Okemo season passes cost 10 years ago!

Retaining Members are now reclassified as Social Members. The 2009 controversy is over. Paul Doughty would be happy!

2023 – With COVID behind us, new challenges and opportunities await.

The summer brings a devastating flood to Ludlow. The Lodge comes out ok, and the town shows its resilience.

A fire prevention system is installed, at the insistence of the Fire Marshal, requiring a \$200/year assessment per active member over 3 years. George Daglieri takes control and gets the job done, and the Lodge will be safer at the end.

Our new automated reservation system has rolled out, and we are slowly getting used to the new procedures.

Bylaw amendment: 50 years as an Active Member qualifies as a Life Member. Congrats Peg Vincent! You deserve it.

2024 – Steve's construction team is at it again, Showers are installed in the 6-bunk rooms, which can now qualify as extra family rooms in a pinch, and not a single bunk is lost.

Frank Item's picnic/dining tables are modified with solid tops, after 58 years of controversy, which will of course continue.

The Fire Marshal has one more "safety" requirement for us: a commercial fire-retardant stove vent system... a drafty kitchen, more expense, and a potentially smoky fireplace.

John Brady passes away at 96. Keep the ticket moving, John. RIP. We will miss you.

2025 – Ross Farrugia donates two new coffee tables he built for the living area. The existing one built by Hank Chubbuck has been repurposed as end tables.

The greatest controversy this year deals with weekend meals. After much discussion, mid-week skiers allow the weekenders to make their own rules. The Club approves John Cressman's proposal of grab-and-go breakfasts and bring-your-own lunches. The end of an era!
